



NYRx, the Medicaid Pharmacy Program allows 90-Day Supplies of most Maintenance Medications and Over-the-Counter Drugs

Why a 90-day supply?

- **Reduce administrative burden for prescribers and pharmacies.** Save time with fewer patient phone calls and reduced refill requests freeing up time for other patient focused care.
- **Improve patient medication adherence and health outcomes.** A survey conducted by the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) showed that adherence was 20% higher for patients prescribed a 90-day supply compared to the patients prescribed a 30-day supply.¹ Additional studies have shown that improving adherence can decrease hospitalization rates improve health outcomes.^{2,3}
- **Increase convenience and reduce copay cost for patients.** Patients will make fewer trips to the pharmacy for refills and reduce their copay to one every 90 days. A 90-day supply provides patients with increased flexibility with more time between refills.

Which drugs are eligible for 90-day supply?

- NYRx covers a 90-day supply for most maintenance medications and over the counter (OTC) drugs. A maintenance medication is a medication taken on a regular basis, often daily, to treat an ongoing or chronic condition or illness such as, but not limited to, **high blood pressure, high cholesterol, diabetes, asthma, depression, mild pain.**

How do you get a 90-day supply?

- Patients should ask their prescriber if a 90-day supply is appropriate for the medication they are taking and request a prescription for a 90-day supply.
- Prescribers should consider writing for a 90-day supply and pharmacies should work with prescribers to switch to a 90-day supply **once a patient is on a stable dose** of a maintenance medication or OTC drug.

Provider helpful hints

- **Prescribers- Electronic Health Records (EHR) Default Settings.** Check with your EHR provider to see if the default setting can be changed to a 90-day prescription supply.
- **Pharmacies-**The pharmacy can still dispense a 30-day supply on the 90-day prescription if requested.
